We were especially honored by the presence of Suffolk County Legislator William "Doc" Spencer as well as our newly elected Huntington Town Councilwoman Joan Cergol. Coordinator of Veterans Affairs Carol Rocco and her husband Tom were also there on this special day.

A contingent of midshipmen from the United States Merchant Marine Academy were our guests once again.

At 11:00 am, our color guard advanced the colors to the monument, followed by our veterans who took their places along the side of the plaza.

Chaplain Charlie Tritto offered the invocation and Commander Dennis Madden led us all in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Walt Whitman High School student Sara Crapanzano then performed our National Anthem beautifully.

In his remarks, Commander Madden repeated the Oath of Enlistment, familiar to all who served.

"Those words had, and will always have, a profound effect on the men and women given the opportunity to speak them. At the very moment they are spoken, a bond is formed and that bond is nurtured and develops over the length of our time in the military."

"Words will not be able to express that bond adequately, but it is there, a brotherhood, forever, and we will take it to our graves, not ever having the opportunity to meet most of the citizens we would each give our lives defending."

"Amazing fact all by itself, isn't it? Only 70 words, directed by someone for us to repeat. Not chosen from our own hearts or considered for long periods of time beforehand, but life changing words, indeed."

Wreaths were placed on the Greenlawn Monument by Greenlawn Post 1244, our Post 1244 Auxiliary, Fred Amore the Commander of VFW Post 9263, Greenlawn Fire Department, Greenlawn Civic Association, Greenlawn Lions Club and Boy Scout and Girls Scout

"Taps" was played by Nicholas Zavack, an 8th grade trumpet player at Oldfield Middle School. Nicholas had been practicing since summer in preparation for his Veterans Day performance. Well done, Nicholas!

We closed our ceremony with vocalist Sara Crapanzano leading us in a spirited rendition of "God Bless America" warming many hearts on such a chilly day.

Herbert Grant, USAF Calverton National Cemetery September 20, 2018

Today, thirty-two caring patriots assembled to remember and bear witness to the interment of Herbert Grant, a Korean War era veteran who served with honor in the U.S. Air Force from 1949 to 1952. After the playing of "Taps" by Post 1244 Bugler Bob Slingo, an Air Force honor guard folded and presented Herbert's Casket flag to Tony Braccia, for his participation in Greenlawn Post 1244. He is not only a contributing Legionnaire, but also a dual memberand Commander of Sons Squadron 1244.

Suffolk County Chaplain Tom Bergin followed with a heart-felt invocation. I then offered a eulogy, highlighting the many similarities between Veteran Grant's Air Force service and my own.

Then I dedicated the poem "You Are Not Alone" to Veteran Grant and the many other forgotten American veterans that have been found and remembered over the years by MIAP.

Mike Williams, MIAP Chaplain then closed our ceremony by offering the benediction. All in attendance then came forward to pay their respects.

Service Officer Report - "You Earned It!"



Service-Disabled Veterans Life Insurance (S-DVI)

If you have a service-connected disability (*even if only 0%*), you may be able to get life insurance under Service-Disabled Veterans Insurance (S-DVI).

Eligibility (All of these must be true):

- You were released from active duty on or after April 25, 1951, and didn't receive a dishonorable discharge, and
- Were rated for a service-connected disability, and
- Are in good health except for any service-connected conditions, and
- Apply within 2 years from the date you were granted your new service-connected disability.

Note: An increase of a rating you had before—or a rating of Individual Unemployability, meaning you can't work—doesn't qualify you for S-DVI.

Life is full of surprises. Sometimes they are welcome. Sometimes they are tragic.

Such was an incident on November 17, on our annual Turkey Run. Our contingent of 10 American Legion Riders set out with 15 Turkeys and fixings. Each visit to a

veteran was enjoyable but unremarkable.

Until one of our last stops. That one visit answered the question: Why do we do what we do?

He was a 93 year old WWII veteran in poor health. We were met at the front door of their 17th St. home by his elderly wife. She looked at us with surprise but with tears in her eyes. At first, I thought she just was happy to see us. But then she told us that her refrigerator had stopped working and that they had no place for the food we had brought. She did say they had just called a repair service to look at it.

We noticed that the flag on the flagpole was terribly ripped. So we replaced the flag and on the road we went.

Just a few stops later we were at Uncle Joe's house. We visited with him while a few of us returned to the house on 17th St. The appliance repairman was now there and he

said it would be a little over \$700 for the repair! I laughed at this repair guy. I had little faith that he knew what he was doing.

We put our ALR's in motion. A few of us got on our phones. The end result was that we bought this very needy WWII veteran and his wife a new refrigerator. P.C. Richards gave us a great price on a floor model for a fraction of what the "repairman" was going to charge to fix the old one. More importantly, we had it delivered to the house and installed in less than 2 hours!

The tragic surprise? Less than three weeks later, our WWII veteran died. Our final act of respect for this man was to provide a flag line for him at the funeral home and a motorcycle escort to Calverton National Cemetery.

Thankfully, we were at least able to provide this last act of honor to a man who served our country when he was called and gave so much to preserve our way of life..

And that is why we do what we do!

Jim Rizzo WWII Veteran Honored

On October 17, Congressman Lee Zeldin (R, NY-1) presented 96-year-old World War II Veteran Sergeant James Rizzo with a tribute the Congressman entered into the Congressional Record to honor his service and sacrifice. The ceremony took place at Arbor Assisted Living in Islandia where Sergeant Rizzo currently resides. Rep. Zeldin is pictured below with Sergeant Rizzo and his loved ones.

Jim is a Post 1244 Legionnaire and is the father-in-law of legionnaire Tony Braccia, our Sons of The American Legion Commander.

The text of the Congressional Record is as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, today I rise to honor the service and sacrifice of James (Jimmy) Rizzo. Growing up in Brooklyn, New York, in the shadow of the Brooklyn Navy Yard, his draft notice arrived in 1942. Mr. Rizzo was sent

to Camp Crowder in Neosho, Missouri for basic training, and upon completion of his training, he was assigned to the 96th Battalion and transferred to Louisiana.

In 1943, he arrived in the Burmese theater, where he would be stationed to serve. Mr. Rizzo was constantly on the move in Burma. His duty was retrieving supplies and packages by airdrop from dangerous jungles and terrains, ensuring these supplies arrived at their military and medical destinations on time and intact. The job was a dangerous one, and during his time in Burma he faced two near-death situations.

Having been promoted from Private to Corporal and then to Sergeant, he was awarded the African and Burma Stars. For his service and sacrifice, our nation will always be indebted to Sergeant Rizzo, and his bravery and selflessness, then and now, continues to inspire us all."

Women Serve Monument

On Saturday, October 13, Greenlawn Post 1244 was honored to take part in the dedication of the "Women Serve" monument at Calverton National Cemetery.

About two years ago, Commissioner Loree Sutton, (US Army Ret), of the NYC Department of Veteran Services proposed the dedication of a monument to all women who have served in our country's armed forces.



Partnering with Dignity Memorial Funeral Homes, Calverton National Cemetery, the Veterans Administration and others, the design soon took shape. Due to the relationship that Post 1244 has had with Dignity Memorial and MIAP Chairman John Caldarelli, we were asked to take part as the sponsoring VSO. We gladly accepted and were able to facilitate the cutting of some of the inevitable red tape that is common in a project such as this.

On a rather bleak, cold and wet day, hundreds of veterans (a great many of whom were women) gathered at the site in Calverton. As usual, Post 1244 was well represented, including a contingent of American Legion Riders. They, along with Riders from Sayville and others raised the flag over the monument and assisted with the unveiling of the monument.

Among the speakers that morning was Past National Commander Denise Rohan, representing the National American Legion. Post 1244 Past Cmdr. Bob Santo addressed the women veterans present and urged them to "...take your rightful place among your fellow veterans. Find and join a veteran's service organization in your community. Add your numbers to our ranks. Make your presence felt and your service known."

A Moment With Chaplain Charlie



I've been volunteering at the Northport VA Medical Center shuttling veterans to and from their appointed clinics for several years now. This is one of their stories.

"The Missing Cap"

I was scheduled to leave but my crew chief asked me to make one

last run. I had to pick up a veteran from one of the vision clinics and bring him to meet his DAV bus in front of the facility. The bus was to leave in 15 minutes so we had to hustle.

When I arrived at the clinic, the elderly gentleman explained that he was afraid he was going to miss his bus. I assured him that we had enough time to navigate the tunnels and get to the bus on time. That's when he threw me a curve ball. He mentioned that somewhere during his appointments he lost his cap. He explained that the cap was very important to him and asked me if we could retrace his steps in order to find it. The clock was running. It was obvious how distraught he was, so I agreed.

I asked him which clinics he visited that day. Vision, Audiology, and the Lab. Tick tock, tick tock..... As we negotiated the tunnels his weak eyes were riveted on the floor in hopes of spotting his beloved cap. "Is that my cap," he asked. "No," I told him. It was only a tile in the old tunnel that was worn down to the brown cement.

I was determined to find his cap. I'd drive him home myself if he missed the bus. Nothing in the Lab. Nothing in the Vision clinic. I wheeled him into the Audiology lab and asked the receptionist if anyone turned in a cap. It was our last hope. "Yes, we have one!" She handed it to me. I turned and asked if it was his cap. His old eyes welled up as he put it on. He then reached out his hand to shake mine, and thanked me again and again for finding his cap. The lump in my throat came suddenly.

It was then that I knew why it was so important to him. The four letters embroidered on it explained everything. "D Day." That weathered cap was the embodiment of all that he and others like him had been through on that June day in 1944. May God bless them all.....

With full bellies and happy hearts, we headed to Atria Senior Living. We found its recreation room filled with



I urge all of our members to spread the word about our post to any and all potential members.



Another calendar year is behind us as you read this article. Our Post has accomplished so very much that it bears repeating what our former 1st Vice, Rich Russano said at our Veterans Day ceremony.

In 2018 we sent 21 Boys and Girls State citizens to upstate SUNY campuses to learn about government. Our oratorical contestants

from St. Pius V School continued to dominate the annual Suffolk County High School Oratorical Contest. We continue to support the Tri-Village Little League and many other civic causes. We have continued to provide committal services for the burial of our fallen and abandoned brothers and sisters with Dignity Memorial and the V.A. under the leadership of John Caldarelli.

We were the impetus for the new Women Serve Monument at Calverton National Cemetery. Once again, our Greenlawn Bugle won the prestigious Best Paper Award from the New York American Legion Press Association for the 10th time and, for the first time, the national award as well. Our Facebook page was awarded second place at the national level as well. Our Veterans in the Classroom Program at Oldfield Middle School continued again this year.

Operation Enduring Care, under the direction of Al Statton, provided personal comfort items for residents of the Northport VA Medical Center as well as 26 new TV's for residents of the hospice and palliative care units. Our Post 1244 membership, the students of Walt Whitman HS, local fire departments, and other American Legion Posts

supported our effort with their donations.

We have partnered with the SailAhead organization to take veterans sailing, using 50 boats from around the region and 150 volunteers, all from the Centerport Yacht Club which embraced the program from the outset. SailAhead has done 1800 veteran sailings to date.

We remain active in our community, Greenlawn, and her needs, with the various groups and organizations that also support us. Sons of The American Legion Brian Madden and Paul Shields, as well as others, provide color guard details for many local ceremonies. Surely, I have only scratched the surface.


