The American Legion played the leading role in drafting and passing the "GI Bill." Its primary activity is working for the interests of veterans and active duty service personnel on such things as benefits, pensions, and health care.

One of the key elements of the American Legion is "Americanism." To this end, our Legion post sponsors a number of programs that look to address the future of our country and its form of government. Among them are Boy's State and Girl's State, Veterans in the Classroom, High School Oratorical Contests, Scouting, and scholarships. The Boy's State and Girl's State programs were founded in the mid-1930's to counter Young Pioneer Camps, which was the name of a Soviet youth program that made inroads in the United States. Boy's State and Girl's State are leadership action programs whose objective is citizenship training in a democratic form of government.

The students selected from the junior class of their high school learn the structure of the government of the state in which it is held, via a two party (but non-

partisan) system, from the city, county, and state organization level. Two students from each state are then selected to attend Boy's or Girl's Nation to further learn the process of our federal government.

Post 1244's first foray into Boy's State was in 2009, with two students from Harborfields High School. We followed with Girl's State in 2014.

As we learned more about the program and spoke to students upon their return, it became apparent just how important this program was at "looking to our future."

Our limiting factor, as is always the case, was funding to cover the tuition for additional students. For the next few years, we worked exclusively with Harborfields and solicited funding for the additional students from the local businesses up and down Broadway in Greenlawn. A door to growth opened to us when the principal of Harborfields, Dr. Dave Bennardo, accepted a position as Superintendent of the South Huntington Schools. This gave us the 'in' we needed to begin working with the students of Walt Whitman High School. Of course, we once again had to look for new sources of funding to take care of these students.

Our opportunity at Huntington High School came through Mr. Joe Leavy, Chair of Humanities and a Scout-

master of a local troop. We met while providing a Flag Etiquette class for his troop. Again, more students created the need for more fund raising.

Who knew "looking to our future" that Boy's State alumni Samuel Alito would become a Supreme Court Justice, that Neil Armstrong would walk on the moon, that Tom Brokaw would anchor NBC Nightly News, that Bill Clinton would become president, that Tim Cook would become Chief Executive of Apple, that Roger Ebert would become a film critic, and that George Pataki would become governor of New York. The list goes on.

Nationwide, over 20,000 students participate in the Boy's State and Girl's State programs annually, with about 1,300 from New York, and over 100 from Suffolk County. "Looking to our future," we can only anticipate what roles the current alumni will play.

In 2018, we sponsored a total of 20 students. For the 2019 program (our 11th year), we will have sponsored more than 100 students in total. We will continue doing our small part at "looking to our future" for our country, and our children and grandchildren!

Service Officer Report - "You Earned It!"

PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTIONS FOR VETERANS

New York state has three different property tax exemptions that are based on your military service, with additional benefits based upon degree of serviceconnected disability.

1. The Alternative Veterans' Exemption - for veterans who served during wartime or received an expeditionary medal.

2.The Cold War Veterans' Exemption - for veterans who served during the Cold War period (1945 – 1991).

3. The Eligible Funds Exemption - for property that a veteran buys with pension, bonus, or insurance funds. Check with your city or county for more information. Qualifying surviving spouses may file for

benefit based on their spouse's service. Exemption applies to local and county property taxes. **Sincerely,**

Missing In America Project

Paul Rene Vallante, US Army Calverton National Cemetery June 21, 2018

On June 21, Korean War Era Veteran Paul Rene Vallante was given full military honors for his service in the United States Army between 1954 and 1956. Approximately 22 attendees participated in the solemn ceremony.

Suffolk County Chaplain Tom Bergin opened the ceremony with a heartfelt invocation. Taps was then played by Post 1244 Bugler Bob Slingo. As Taps was completed, the Army Honor Guard folded and presented Veteran Vallante's casket flag to Legionnaire Slingo. I then offered a eulogy and included the poem "We Will Find You," dedicated to all of our missing and yet to be found. Chaplain Bergin added some commentary and closed our ceremony by offering his benediction. As we approached Veteran Vallante's casket to pay our final respects, a sense of closure could be felt. Once again, one of our brothers-in-arms was respectfully laid to rest.

John J. Robinson, US Army Calverton National Cemetery August 9, 2018

We assembled, this day, to remember and bear witness to the interment of John J. Robinson, a Vietnam War Veteran, who served with honor in U.S. Army during the turbulent 1960's. These were difficult years for our country and especially difficult for those of us in uniform both overseas and at home. We were misunderstood by some and, even worse, disrespected and spat on by others. John passed away just one month ago.

John was 68 and alone. Although he passed with no family at his side, each of the 21 attendees at today's honors welcomed him home and rendered slow salutes as we offered our final goodbyes.

Suffolk County Chaplain Tom Bergin opened the ceremony with a heartfelt Invocation. Taps followed. As Taps was completed, the Army Honor Guard folded and presented Veteran Robinson's casket flag to Greenlawn Post 1244 Legionnaire Hal Dieterle. We recognized Hal for his ongoing dedication to our Post 1244 MIAP Team, and his volunteer work at the Veterans Administration Medical Center in Northport, NY.

Then I offered a eulogy and dedicated the poem "Day Is Done" to Veteran Robinson and the many other

"First Salvo" by Lenny Salvo

During basic training at Fort Dix, a Captain looked at my last name and said: "Son, with a name like that the Army has one place for you - in the artillery." With that being said, I was sent to Fort Sill and trained on all the artillery pieces - 105, 155, 8-inch, and 175.

In Vietnam, I made the rank of Spec-4 and became the assistant gunner. My job was to set the tube at the proper deflection and elevation, as given to us by the Fire Direction Center. It was an honor for me to fire the first 175 round in Vietnam. *The Stars and Stripes* newspaper wrote it up as... "Salvo fires the first salvo in Vietnam."



On Nov. 19, 1965, Specialist Fourth Class Len Salvo pulled the lanyard on the first 175 mm artillery round fired in Vietnam.

Did You Know?

Did you know that the American Legion Riders recently helped raise nearly \$1.26 million for scholarships for children of fallen military and disabled veterans on the American Legion Legacy Run 2018.

SailAhead - Healing Wounded Veterans Through Sailing



What could possibly bring together 40 sailboats, 5 power boats, 125 veterans, 78 family members and guests, and over 100 sailboat crewmembers out onto Northport Harbor on a warm Long Island summer day?

It is the need to spread awareness of Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) which has affected many thousands of veterans and which has led to an epidemic of suicides by veterans of all war eras. Some studies have estimated that an average of 22 veterans take their own lives each day.

SailAhead's 4th annual "Let's Take a Veteran Sailing" event at Centerport Yacht Club was an emotional reminder of the toll that veteran suicide is taking, not only on the victims, but on their surviving family, comrades and friends.

This year's event was dedicated to Matthew Adam Wilson, 75th Ranger Division, 2nd Battalion, who ended his

life last September at the age of 36. Matt was represented by several friends who had served with him.

An important goal of Sail-Ahead is to make sure that the surviving families know that they are not forgotten.

This year, SailAhead has



partnered with Army Week Association for a friendly regatta, conducted a "Let's Take a Veteran Sailing" event in Tacoma, Washington, sailings at Babylon Yacht Club, South Bay Cruisers and regular sailings with veterans aboard the Oyster Sloop Priscilla.

In coming weeks, SailAhead will be participating in the Clagget / Oakcliff Match Race for handicapped sailors. We hope to be making use of our Hunter 38 "Stargazer" to take small groups of veterans for some afternoon sailings.

We hope that 2019 will bring us more opportunities to serve our veterans and their families.

American Legion Greenlawn Post 1244 is proud to have partnered with SailAhead since 2015. Together, we have helped spread awareness of veteran suicide, honor the victims of suicide and their surviving families and offer healing experiences to veterans suffering from PTSD.

Post 1244's Future Home Update

The renovation of the former New York State Armory on 5th Street in Huntington Station has hit a "snag."

The building, which is to become the James E. Conte Community Center' will include the future home of American Legion Greenlawn Post 1244.

In December, 2016, the architectural firm DCAK-MSA Architectural and Engineering was selected by the Town to create plans to renovate the Armory into a community center at a cost not to exceed \$603,000. The contract covered conceptual design, permitting, contract documents, construction, inspecting, and monitoring.

In May, the firm submitted a supplemental fee request, asking for an additional \$850,000, raising their total design fee to \$1.453 million.

There were other problems with the conceptual plans that raised the total cost of the project to \$14.2 million, versus the anticipated budget of \$10 million.

On August 7, the Town Board unanimously approved a

resolution to revoke the agreement with DCAK-MSA and sign an agreement with BBS Architects, Landscape Architects and Engineers.

The Armory was acquired by the Town from New York State in 2012. It is going to be a large scale eco-friendly community and recreation center.

and other personal care items.

The hospital does not provide these for their patients. We urge you to come out and join us in raising funds to help our veterans in need.

We are planning to make a \$500 donation to Operation Enduring Care soon, and are hoping to generate matching donations from a non-profit that the post is in discussions with. We will also be supporting America's VetDogs with a donation.

Many of our Sons are also members of our *American Legion Riders Chapter 1244*. Not only do they participate in hundreds of ALR missions each year, but these dedicated men participate on our Sons squadron 1244 as well. I cannot thank Bruce and his fellow Legion Riders enough for their support.

Membership in Sons Squadron 1244 is a privilege afforded to only a limited number of men. Because of this, we urge all current members to find a way to participate in some way.

We belong to the Sons of The American Legion in order to honor our fathers' and grandfathers' service. It is in their name that we work to help our veterans and their families in their time of need.

We are currently in the process of planning for our fiscal year 2018-2019 campaign to support the needs of our most vulnerable population of veterans in the Community Living Centers (CLC's) at the Northport VA Medical Center.

This year, we purchased and delivered twenty five 32" flat screen TV's to the hospice patients in building 8. We understand that this building will eventually be entirely devoted to hospice care as well as respite care for those who are nearing the end of life.

In addition to supplying personal comfort and care items not supplied to the patients by the VA, we will be seeking to provide some special needs furniture for the units. These would provide some level of comfort for the veteran's visitors who would like to spend time with their loved ones. House Homeless Shelter is reopened, we hope to provide the residents there with lots of personal care items and nonperishable food as we have done in years past. We are hoping their doors will open soon.

Did You Know?

The American Legion etched a permanent place in history in 1944. That year, Legionnaires ushered into law the Servicemen's Readjustment Act – better known as the GI Bill. Since then, millions of veterans have received free or discounted higher education benefits. So effective was the GI Bill, it is often credited for spurring more than 50 years of economic prosperity across the nation.

Women Veterans Memorial at Calverton



Two years ago, American Legion Post 1244 was approached by representatives of U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs Calverton National Cemetery, Dignity Memorial Funeral Homes and New York City Department of Veterans Services (NYC Veterans). We were asked to help in the planning of a Women Veterans Memorial to be installed at Calverton National Cemetery.

The idea of a memorial to honor all women veterans who have served our country since its beginning was suggested by retired Brig. Gen. Loree Sutton, Commissioner at New York City Department of Veterans Services.

Almost two years later, after much planning, consulting and negotiating of red tape, the dedication has been scheduled for Saturday, October 13, 2018.

Some 3 million women have served in defense of our nation, since its beginning nearly 250 years ago.

Women now make up 20 percent of new recruits, 15 percent of the active-duty force and 18 percent of the

reserve and National Guard. Almost 280,000 women have served in Operations Enduring Freedom, Iraqi Freedom and New Dawn. More than 2 million veterans — about 9 percent of the total veteran population of 21 million — are women.

Female service members and veterans who pioneered the battle field for today's service women must be honored for their service to our country at a time when women had not yet had been granted the right to vote.

Among the honored guests who will be speaking at this event will be American Legion Past National Commander Denise Rohan, who has just completed her term in office. She is the first woman elected as national commander of the American Legion.

The West Point Band is scheduled to perform for this ceremony.

We hope that many of you can join us for this important occasion.

A Moment With Chaplain Charlie



I began volunteering at the Northport VA Medical Center several years ago. The following are my earliest...."Thoughts of a VA Volunteer."

There was a diverse group of patients scattered throughout the pavilion of the VA Medical Center in Northport, NY. The weath-

ered baseball caps that dotted the room left no doubt as to who these people were: "WWII Veteran," "United States Marine Corps," "Korean Veteran," "US Army," "Vietnam Veteran," "US Air Force," "Desert Storm"..... Whatever the embroidery, these souls were all members of a select group of Americans. They were veterans. Whatever their station in life outside this complex, in here, they all shared a common, unbreakable bond that each would cherish to the end.

It was my first day as a VA volunteer escort. As I entered the Escort Service office it was apparent that, at 67, I was one of the youngest in the room. Like me, most of my co-workers were also veterans. Over the next few weeks, I shadowed them and learned the ropes. Our mission was to shuttle patients between clinics within the massive complex either by wheelchair or stretcher. We became their companions if only for a few moments, our brief friendships ending at their assigned clinic. I've had the privilege of assisting veterans from World War II through Iraq and Afghanistan. Most memorable were those from our Greatest Generation. Now in their 90's, frail yet proud, they spoke of bygone days, as we waited for an elevator or made our way through the tunnels. They recounted times when they were young and strong and served in faraway places with strange sounding names. Though their words came up through their throats, their eyes told the real stories.

All veterans, but especially those with the scars of war should serve as role models to the rest of us. They possess character traits that were once the norm throughout our land but sadly, may no longer be. They still believe that a handshake trumps a contract, that sacrifice builds character, that courtesy and respect have a place in society, and that working toward the greater good is more important than gaining individual benefit. Perhaps most importantly, they expect nothing they have not earned.

As escorts, we are often thanked by our veterans for the assistance we provide. Ironically, it is we that owe each of them a debt of gratitude for their service to this great nation of ours. We can all learn from the good men and women within the walls of the Northport, VA Medical Center and VA hospitals like it throughout the country. They are, literally, a dying breed. May God bless them all.

Michael Blanco Street Dedication

July 1st was a normal summer Sunday morning. The word had gone out a few days earlier that, on this day, a section of Wichard Blvd. in Commack would be renamed in honor of the late L. Cpl. Michael Blanco. Michael was the son of American Legion Riders Chapter 1244 President Bruce Blanco and his wife, Donna.

It was expected to be a low key event, a ceremony to honor the service and memory of a 19 year old Marine, whose experiences in the military had affected him so much that, in 2010, he took his own life.

As the 10:00 am hour approached, the streets began to fill with hundreds of veterans, bikers and other citizens from all over Long Island as well as officials from the Town of Smithtown. Two fire department ladder trucks unfurled a giant American flag in Michael's honor.

We learned from Michael's parents, and others, that he was not only a patriotic young American, but one who, as a young boy showed a desire to be of service to those in need, showing compassion to his less fortunate schoolmates.

Now, on the street where he grew up, his name will never be forgotten. This ceremony marked the first time



that a community in Suffolk County has memorialized a serviceman who lost his life due to PTSD. It is estimated that, every day, approximately 20 veterans commit suicide.

We hope that commemorations like this will help to remove the stigma of PTSD and related veteran suicides so that no more of our finest sons and daughters are lost to this tragic epidemic.


